Legal Analysis

- Chapter 115C concerns school boards. NCGS 115C-37("Election of Board members) says (in relevant part) that "the election shall be conducted according to the provisions of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes then governing primary elections."
- 2. Local Boards have the ability to modify the general rules that apply to them, and there are numerous local acts, contained in the Sessions Laws, that apply to particular bodies. In Chapter 93 of the 1995 Session Laws there is an act entitled "AN ACT TO PROVIDE THAT THE BUNCOMBE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION SHALL BE ELECTED ON A NONPARTISAN PLURALITY BASIS ON THE DATE OF THE GENERAL ELECTION." The last section of that Act provides as follows:
 - Sec. 4. Section 7 of Chapter 532 of the Session Laws of 1975, as amended by Section 5 of Chapter 178 of the Session Laws of 1981, reads as rewritten:
 - "Sec. 7. The election of said members of the Buncombe County Board of Education in the various primary elections as hereinabove provided for shall be governed by the applicable provisions of Chapters 115C and Chapter 163 of the General Statutes, relating to primaries and elections, insofar as the same may be applicable and not in conflict with the expressed terms of this act. The Buncombe County Board of Elections is hereby authorized and empowered to create any necessary precincts, to appoint any necessary election officials and to set up and establish all necessary books and records for the conduct of said elections."
- This local Act specifically states that the rules of Chapter 163 relating to elections, and not primaries, govern the election of Board of Education members.
- 4. NCGS 163-284.1 provides that elections for school administrative units are a "special district election."
- 5. NCGS 163-294.1(a) says that it applies to special district elections.
- 6. NCGS 163-294.1(b) provides, in relevant part, that "If a candidate in a nonpartisan election dies, becomes disqualified, or withdraws before election day and after the ballots have been printed, the board of elections shall determine whether there is enough time to reprint the ballots. If there is not enough time to reprint the ballots, and should the deceased or disqualified candidate receive enough votes to be elected, the board of elections shall declare the office vacant, and it shall be filled as provided by law." (Emphasis added)
- 7. The language of NCGS 163-294.1(b) is very specific; in the section quoted above, there are three distinct situations anticipated for a candidate: death, disqualification or withdrawal. The distinction between the three enumerated

Factual Analysis

- 1. Along with others, Chip Craig and Mark Crawford timely filed for the seat in issue.
- 2. Mark Crawford, by affidavit dated October 1, 2008, filed with the Buncombe County Board of Elections a "Withdrawal of Candidacy." In this document he unequivocally withdrew his candidacy for the Office of School Board (Owen District).
- Apparently the withdrawal of candidacy by Mark Crawford occurred after the ballots had been printed.
- 4. Apparently the board of elections determined that there was not enough time to reprint the ballots to remove Mark Crawford's name, so the election proceeded with the ballots containing Mark Crawford's name.
- It was well publicized that Mark Crawford had withdrawn his candidacy, as there
 were several references in news articles in the Asheville Citizen Times, apparently
 based upon information from the Board of Elections.
- 6. In the general election on November 4, 2008, Mark Crawford received the most votes for the Owen District seat.
- Apparently the board of elections initially reported that Chip Craig was the winner
 of the Owen seat, based upon the fact that Mark Crawford had withdrawn his
 candidacy.
- 8. On November 5, 2008 someone at the board of elections opined to Chip Craig that in fact he had not won the seat, and that Mark Crawford would be declared the winner.
- 9. In an article on the first page of the Asheville Citizen Times on November 6, 2008, Mark Crawford announced that he intended to serve as the Owen District representative to the Buncombe County Board of Education because a "plurality" of voters decided that he should serve. It is noteworthy that the article noted that calls to the board of elections were not returned, and apparently no one from the board of elections opined on this matter at that time.
