1. What motivates you to apply for this position?

As a native of Western North Carolina I feel invested in my surrounding community and a need to give back to my community. Through my experience working as an adjunct instructor at Asheville Buncombe Technical Community College I think I've had the unique opportunity to work with a good cross-section of Asheville's residents and listen to their concerns and worries about their community. This experience was further enhanced by my work as an Obama Organizing Fellow this summer registering residents to vote, organizing and running informational meetings, and working within a diverse community with sometimes opposing views.

One of my other motivations is that I am someone who rents and lives within walking distance of downtown and therefore my views about the future of my community is directly influenced by my experience living in an urban environment.

2. Where do you fall on the conservative-liberal spectrum in terms of fiscal and social policy?

If I were to plot out my political leanings I would come up as fiscally conservative and socially liberal. I believe in a balanced budget, but I also believe that there are projects that pay themselves back over time and are therefore worth running a deficit if those projects quickly pay that deficit back down through increased revenue or save money over time.

Fiscal and social policy have to be balanced simply because these two are linked to one another and therefore sacrifices have to be made to one or the other in the interest of the community. While it is a terrible thing to cut social programs; it is equally a terrible thing to run our community

3. In your eyes, what should be the top 2 or 3 priorities our City Council should be focused on in the upcoming year and why?

The overriding problem that Asheville is faced with is related to growth. There needs to be a consensus on the downtown master plan, the Unified Development Ordinance needs to have various loop holes closed, and the city needs to promote a smart thoughtful growth pattern outside of downtown to avoid unchecked sprawl. Asheville is constantly growing and with that growth comes environmental issues, traffic issues, and some neighborhoods are unfortunately sacrificed.

Given the economic problems the nation faces as a whole, this pinch will be particularly felt in the Asheville economy due to our reliance on tourism. The aforementioned issues will have to be retuned to deal with the economic downturn and therefore quick fixes must be avoided. While it is nice to see a quick turnaround of revenue, the city must balance the immediate cost with the long term cost to our community.

4. What do you consider the most crucial problem, need, or cause for the citizens of Asheville? How would you approach its resolution or champion the cause?

As mentioned above there are many problems facing Asheville, but the largest problem is that the Asheville economy is unfortunately linked directly to tourism. This means that an overriding amount of residents are economically bound to the service industry. The city council needs to attempt to diversify Asheville's economy by bringing (hopefully) environmentally friendly manufacturing jobs to our area. While there are many different approaches to bringing more manufacturing jobs to our area, one example is to work in tandem with surrounding schools to bring more manufacturers to the Asheville area. We have nationally recognized schools in our area and should use that fact to bring in more industry.

5. 2008-09 and 2009-10 fiscal years will be financially tough for the City. What will be your top funding priorities and what would you like to see reduced to balance the budget?

To help balance the budget I would suspend all capital projects unless they are deemed urgent or have progressed too far (i.e. already in construction) to suspend those projects. Other budgetary items to be looked into are the amount the city spends on vehicles, consultants, and any programs/departments that are budgetary black holes.

Programs that I would not cut are the Public Safety Department, the affordable housing initiatives, Transit Services Fund, and the money the city spends on city events (i.e. artistic endeavors). While I wish I could cut the money on city events, I would hesitate to do that because we are still in a tourist centric economy in Asheville and those events bring money into our community.
