Asheville has been my adopted home since 2005. I first visited in 1998 and began to prepare for an eventual move here. After growing up in New York City, and spending my early adult life in Florida, I now enjoy the many exciting virtues of a cosmopolitan and lovely Asheville community, where I can offer in exchange, the strongest combination of skills in law, education, and the arts.

### 1. What motivates you to apply for this position?

My sole motivation for applying for this role is a desire to serve the public as an advocate for Asheville, who will faithfully perform the serious responsibilities entrusted to me. I would endeavor to consider all relevant facts to make informed choices in every policy decision; to analyze long and short term impacts of Council decisions; and to maximize the potential benefits for the City that may be derived from the assets of Asheville for both present and future generations, by fostering the highest quality of life for residents, and by offering a welcoming environment for visitors. I envision Asheville with abundant opportunities that are the bounty of a truly healthy and prosperous city, that will someday serve as a model for other cities to follow. I would like to listen to and represent the voices of all Asheville citizens on matters before the City Council.

2. Where do you fall on the conservative-liberal spectrum in terms of fiscal and social policy?

My views emphasize the rights of citizens to enjoy equality of opportunity for both individuals and business interests. The term "liberal" generally means favorable to progress or reform, having view or policies advocating individual freedom of action and expression, freedom from prejudice or bigotry, and not bound by conventional ideas or values, so perhaps I might be considered somewhat liberal. However, my interpretation of any issue would require tailored responses depending upon facts and circumstances. I see the unity of our mutual interests as we create a city we are both proud of and prosper in together. I see a community that is working well together.

Each policy matter should to be considered on its own merits without an across-the-board mandate from a specific party platform or interest. I wouldn't choose "change" just to do something different, but I wouldn't cling to the traditional or try to resurrect the past unless there is a benefit to Asheville. I would not avoid wrestling with challenges necessitated by a fresh look at circumstances in the present, or in consideration of future outcomes. I have personally thrived on change and can recommend it, in general. As a member of Asheville City Council, I would support the rule of law, freedom of speech and thought, an individual's right to enjoy private property, and policies to promote free and fair trade that would encourage well-paying jobs, affordable housing for all, and an inclusive community spirit that aptly expresses excitement about our diverse and multifaceted city, our rich history, and the abundant natural beauty surrounding us.

In this age of enlightenment (of our own creation), all citizens have equal rights by law. The liberal spectrum should encompass an the economic system is based on free markets to help generate an efficient and prosperous market. This would be the driving force of my fiscal policy to ensure the rights of all citizens of Asheville.

3. In your eyes, what should be the top 2 or 3 priorities our City Council should be

focused on in the upcoming year and why?

The top priorities for our City Council should be expanding our economy beyond the tourism sector and service jobs, especially by encouraging a green economy which would be very timely as we are urgently noting the challenges of global warming and economic downturn. Asheville is ideally positioned with many potential former manufacturing sites, now underutilized, that might qualify to become brownfields-designated sites, attracting clean and green manufacturing jobs, and enabling economic incentives under existing federal and state programs. We also have an enthusiastic education community poised to provide the necessary educational programs and training facilities. Asheville is positioned to foster the genesis of a green workforce for the WNC region extending into neighboring states, and global economies. Building on our infrastructure and facilitating affordable housing through high density sustainable development are essential goals but building a prosperous community with solid companies and good jobs will advance these matters as well.

4. What do you consider the most crucial problem, need, or cause for the citizens of Asheville? How would you approach its resolution or champion the cause?

The financial situation of the working class is a crucial problem that challenges our community, although the challenges are nationwide and even global. We have a huge gang population and crime-ridden neighborhoods, which would be mitigated by economic prosperity. Lack of economic opportunities leads the educated youth to move away from Asheville, and the despair of many who are not included in our dreams and goals of prosperity leads to bad choices and behavior. Asheville is a caring community and WNC has a high number of nonprofit organizations. However, what we need most is good jobs.

As I stated in Essay 3, I would like to see an expansion of Asheville's economy, particularly by making strong efforts in the creation of a green manufacturing, and by the supporting roles of education and training for such jobs, and marketing of the related products and services.

I am personally skilled in matters to champion this effort because of my experience as a government lawyer for the Charlotte County Board of County Commissioners, counseling Commissioners and multiple advisory boards, and departmental staff including Purchasing; Florida's Department of Environmental Protection, working with petroleum contamination issues which were interrelated with brownfields regulation; at the Florida House of Representatives, working in statutory law and research for various state and federal matters; at SpectraSite Communications, an international tower consolidator, working in asset auditing and marketing in the wireless telecommunications industry. In addition, my work as an educator, graphic artist, Realtor®-Associate, and marketer, and participation in an entrepreneurial support group at the Darden School, University of Virginia, and other business experience, enables me to generate the kind of planning that Asheville needs to succeed in this venue.

5. 2008-09 and 2009-10 fiscal years will be financially tough for the City. What will be your top funding priorities and what would you like to see reduced to balance the budget?

I would like to encourage funding for economic development projects with emphasis on re-developing Asheville, especially with renovations utilizing green solutions; marketing Asheville's visibility as a desirable lifestyle and tourist destination in the global economy; increasing business partnerships with Asheville City Schools for various ventures and adventures; and fostering new business partnerships with our sister cities, and bringing in new "sisters."

To save money on staff time and efforts, I would like to see land development processes consolidated and streamlined, and procedures made simpler and clearer to provide better notice to potential developers of what they must do to obtain permitting approvals, depending on the size and scope of projects. It's essential to provide an estimated timeline for planning and approvals that allows for obtaining public input and feedback in a more expedient fashion. Standards of compliance for engineering should be clear so that notice is served. This will save Asheville money in the long run, especially in terms of perception of a business-friendly environment.

We can also be sure that we plan well for Asheville's budget by asking the right questions, and making good use of the skills of our advisory board and commission members.

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
